The journal publishes papers on all aspects of religious thought, life, theology and culture, from the fifteenth to seventeenth centuries. Despite this inclusivity, many successful submissions remain confined to traditional subjects, rather than exploring new forms of interdisciplinary study.

R&RR now faces the challenge of negotiating new modes of interdisciplinary enquiry, forged by 21st century research cultures.

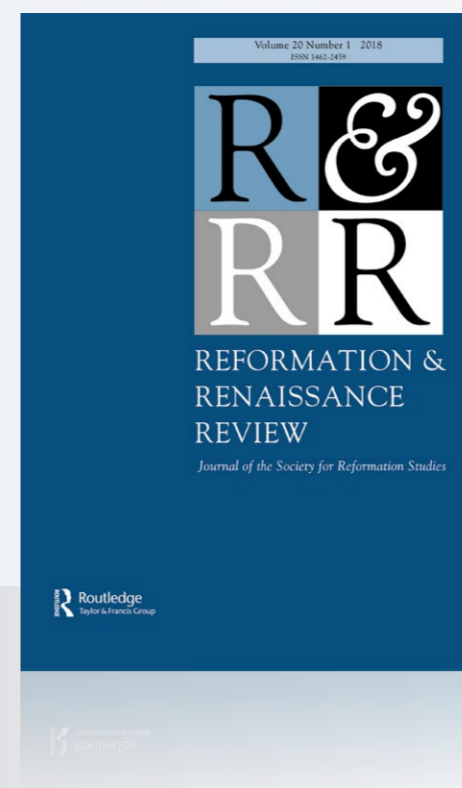

Attracting Interdisciplinary Submissions

R&RR's Editors conducted a **SWOT analysis** to crystallise their thinking, develop a strategy, and identify opportunities to encourage more 'new' interdisciplinary submissions.

STRENGTHS

- Official journal of the Society for Reformation Studies
- Strong international presence, both in its contributors and editorial board
- At the forefront of 'old' interdisciplinary study

WEAKNESSES

- Hesitant to engage with newer modes of interdisciplinary study
- Just 3 of 34 editorial board members currently have expertise in these new approaches

OPPORTUNITIES

- 'Old' and 'new' modes of interdisciplinary study can be accommodated in exciting, constructive ways

THREATS

- Within the disciplines of Divinity, History, and Literature, the paradigms of 'Reformation' and 'Renaissance' continue to be challenged by a more expansive sense of the 'early modern' and socio-cultural trends in interdisciplinary enquiry that study the religion of the past as 'lived experience'



Looking Forwards



Initiate discussions with stake holders about setting out a clear strategy on engaging with 'new' interdisciplinary study.



Monitor the interdisciplinary scope of submissions over the next four years.



Achieve 25% of successful submissions within the 'new' interdisciplinary approaches, and achieve a corresponding shift in expertise on the editorial board.



Use the discussions and evidence collated over the previous five years to build a strategic action plan for continuing to publish 'new' modes of interdisciplinary research.

Case Study

The Society for Reformation Studies hosted a conference on 'Gender and Sexuality in the Reformation' in 2014 which attracted high numbers of academics working within 'new' models of interdisciplinary study.

100% of authors featured in special issue also presented papers at the conference

R&RR published a special issue the following year, championing high-quality submissions in this subject area from many of the conference speakers.
